To Those About To Leave Midway: It is not only urged but required that strict secrecy be maintained concerning Naval or Military Information you may have acquired at Midway. Disclosing or permitting to be disclosed information concerning national defense is a Crime under Title 50, Section 31, United States Code Annotated—the espionage act. Each of you have a duty to your country to report anyone whose glib tongue may affect the national security. Section 35, of the same statute makes it a crime to conceal the violation of the statute by another party. This is war time and every effort will be made to enforce the espionage act. Do not give your wife the opportunity to spread details about Midway at the weekly bridge club. — Bon Voyage

Many American Soldiers disembarked safely in Australia today. They have been arriving in various parts of Australia since Mid February. Washington experts said not a single soldier was lost in troop movements to Ireland or Australia so far.

Australian Communique issued today announced that Australian Planes inflicted heavy damage on Japanese aircraft at Rabaul on New Britain Island The Australians destroyed 3 enemy planes and damaged 10 others when a tomb was dropped at planes that were closely packed. Runways were also destroyed in the same area. The Communique further reports that Japanese Fighters attacked Port Moresby with Machine gun and Cannon fire. Only casualty was a leg wound suffered by an Australian flier.

The All India radio announced that the Japanese were losing heavily in Southern Hunan Province in China, where a fierce battle is in progress.

Action in the Philippines was so slight that the War Department did not issue a Communique today.

A joint British and American Communique issued today announced the losses in the great Java Sea battle that started on February 27th. The greatly outnumbered Allied forces lost 13 warships, while 8 of the enemy warships were put out of action. United States losses in this battle was the U.S. Cruiser Houston, and U.S. Destroyer Polk.

Lt. Gov. Von Moot announced in Australia today, that Dutch forces are known to be carrying out a large scale fight in Java, Sumatra, and Celebe.

Only action in Burma amounted to patrol skirmishes. British operations proceed well about 80-miles north of Rangoon.

No fresh news about the Japanese fleet reported to be sighted in the Solomon Islands.

The R.A.F. struck fresh blows. The British Air Ministry announced that heavy blows were made in the Colonge area where German industries were the target. The fliers reported that many big fires were started in this sector. Airdromes in Northern France were bombed. 11 German fighters were shot down, and not a British flier was scratched.

Soviet dispatches indicate successful action on all fronts. General Georgy Konstantinovich Zhukov's Red forces on the central front liberated 11 more villages. That 14000 Germans were killed in 15 days of righting North-West of Moscow, and also 84 Inhabited localities were recaptured.

Cairo reports that British Field guns dispersed small Axis transport columns. British Artillery was active all day Friday, west of Tobruk. Enemy aircraft activities were increasing in this area. One enemy bomber was shot down into the sea by antiaircraft fire.

In Argentina 8 Japanese were arrested, and great quantities of firearms was seized.

--News Dispatch from Rio De Janeiro indicates that Leon Henderson is making arrangements to ship more raw materials from Brazil to the U.S.A. --Men, age 16 or more will have to register Monday in Australia.
